ALUMNI SPOTLIGHT: Charity

In an era abuzz with teacher shortages, one Native American scholarship recipient aims to make a difference by achieving a teaching certificate. Her name is Charity, and she hopes to complete her bachelor's in Early Childhood Education at Sinte Gleska University.

An alum of St. Joseph's Indian School, Charity was named one of the recipients of a St. Joseph's scholarship. The scholarship program was started in 1985 to support Native Americans pursuing higher education. During the 2023-24 school year, St. Joseph's awarded \$233,214 to Native American students!

Charity said receiving the scholarship helps alleviate some of the financial stress that comes with pursuing a degree.

"Being a parent and doing classes is challenging," Charity said, but she does it out of love for her four daughters.

St. Joseph's Celebrates 48th Annual Powwow

The powwow event at St. Joseph's explores and celebrates the Lakota culture.

As the sun sets on another successful powwow, we at St. Joseph's Indian School are reminded of the power of unity and community. The annual gathering serves as a beacon of hope and a testament of the resilience of the Lakota (Sioux) people.

The impact this event has is why St. Joseph's holds a powwow each year in celebration of the rich and vibrant Lakota culture. This year's 48th Annual Powwow was no exception, with attendees from all walks of life coming together to participate in the festivities.

One of the highlights of the wachipi — powwow

— celebration was the dreamcatcher making workshop, where visitors learned about the history and significance of this traditional Native American craft. The intricate designs and careful weaving of the dreamcatchers serve as a reminder of the importance of dreams and aspirations in the Lakota culture.

Another popular event was the hand games demonstration, where participants learned about the traditional games that have been passed down through generations. These games not only provide entertainment, but also serve as a way to connect with the past and preserve the heritage of the Lakota people.

For those interested in seeing our school, homes, Equine Therapy Center and more, guided tours of



the campus were also available. Visitors had the opportunity to see firsthand the impact of the school on the lives of the Lakota children who call it home.

But the main event of the powwow was, of course, the powwow competition, where dancers of all ages and abilities showcased their skills and talents. The colorful regalia and rhythmic drumbeats created a mesmerizing sight.

What makes the powwow at St. Joseph's Indian School truly special is the diversity of attendees. People of all ages and backgrounds come together in celebration of the Lakota culture. It is a reminder that no matter where we come from, we can all find common ground in our shared humanity and appreciation for the traditions of others.
